A few years ago, a friend of mine, who knew I was a quilter, asked me if I knew of anywhere or anyone who would accept baby guilts made by her 80+ year old mother. Her mother lives in Bloomington, IL. Thank you so much to everyone that has participated! I told her that guilt guilds would probably love to have those guilts to Lisa Klingbeil and the Fabric Fondlers Bee distribute to people in need. My friend said that they had tried to contact guilds in the Bloomington area and had no luck. I then told her about our Riverwalk Guild and the philanthropy committee and all that we do and where the guilts are distributed in our area. My friend was thrilled to hear that the guilts were going to people in need. Her mother in Bloomington was also thrilled to know that a group was doing such good work. Since then, I have been receiving boxes of very nicely made baby guilts from my friend every few months as she returns from visiting her mother. The last group of guilts included fabric and guilting books that will go to our philanthropy group and books to our June rummage sale as my friend's mother, at her age, feels it is time to stop sewing. I mention this to say that our philanthropy committee in our guild is unique. Not only do we have a sew-in for charity once a year, our group each month offers kits for us to sew for those in need and our committee distributes these items to various charities in the area. The Philanthropy committee has been a part of our guild since our guild started. It is good work that really should continue! Let's keep "loving people" in our area as best we can. Mystery BOM for April

This month's block for the 2024 Mystery Block of the Month has a New-to-Me unit...the cat's cradle unit.

If you've struggled with this unit before or are concerned about needing to make something you haven't made before, the pattern designer, Sherri McConnell, shares a tutorial in this month's video on how to make a cat's cradle unit with a specialty ruler by Creative Grids or how to make it the traditional way as outlined in this month's pattern.

After completing this month's block, you should have a total of 4 blocks (we're 1/3 of the way there!) which is enough to make a small project if you aren't able to finish the full quilt...but of course I hope you will!

Bring your block(s) or completed item(s) to an upcoming Show and Tell or maybe you prefer to wait until the end of the year after your entire quilt has been made to reveal the mystery. It will be fun to see everyone's variations on this project.

Spring Challenge Theme: Riverwalk 30

Challenge Due Date: July guild meeting, July 9, 2024

Challenge Overview:

- Make a quilted item that represents the word "Riverwalk" and the number "30".
- Your interpretation of the word and number do not need to be literal interpretations – get creative if you'd like!
- Makers should be prepared to allow their item to be on display locally for a short period of time after the challenge (dates and location are still TBD)

Challenge Instructions:

- 1. Make your quilted item using the guidelines above.
- 2. If it is not obvious when looking at your item, write a brief explanation of how you interpreted the word "Riverwalk" and the number "30".
- 3. Bring your completed item and the written explanation to the July guild meeting for display
- 4. Members will vote for the top 3 entries at the July meeting.
- Challenge winners will be announced at the August meeting and will receive a prize

We used to meet in person in Wheaton. Then came Covid, and we decided to meet via **Zoom**. This was a big success, and we have become a virtual guild. We have a member who lives in Quito Ecuador who joins our meetings live and others in Canada, Europe and all over the US.

We meet on the **second Saturday** of every other month at **9:30 a.m. Central time--February, April, June, August, October, and December**.

Some of our members quilt for others professionally and others, including me, quilt for ourselves and various charities like Quilts Beyond Borders and Quilts of Valor.

We have had live speakers from South Africa, Spain, Canada, and the US. We currently have 94 members.

Julie finished high school in Lincoln, Nebraska. Soon after college she married her husband Dane who was a Marine pilot. He brought them to Naperville by flying with American Airlines and is now retired. She loves to travel, especially to rugged places in Africa.

Julie has spent a lot of time in U.S. national parks and on Indian reservations. She is pleased to be involved in such a great group of women who value quilting for all generations and have a true heart for giving generously to all their causes.

Peggie Getz: June Party.

Peggie joined the guild about ten years ago. While living in New England, she and the other mothers in her mom's group decided to take a quilting class. She made a quilt-as-you-go sampler and loved it. She enjoys picking out fabrics and especially likes piecing tops.

Peggie grew up in St. Louis and graduated from the University of Missouri where she met her husband.

Due to his job, she moved around a lot, living in Louisiana, Michigan (twice), Connecticut, and finally here in Illinois.

After moving to Naperville, she was hired at Nichols Library to work on Tuesday evenings, preventing her from joining the guild where several of her friends were members. After her hours changed, she joined and has been with us ever since.

Deb Obriecht: June Party.

Deb joined the guild about twenty years ago and has served in many capacities on the board including treasurer, philanthropy, and hospitality.
